Montana Petition Facts and History

 $I_{\rm n}$ 1906, Montana voters approved the creation of initiative and referendum - a system of making laws by the people.

There are different types of statewide petitions relating to statutory initiatives, constitutional initiatives, and initiative referendums. This presentation does not cover candidate petitions, party petitions, recall petitions, or local petitions.

All signature gatherers should know and follow all guidelines and applicable laws.

As a signature gatherer, paid or voluntary, you are on the front lines of the system and are helping to amend or create a state law!

Rights of Signature Gatherers

<u>13-27-611</u>, <u>MCA</u>. Physical prevention of obtaining signatures or physical intimidation of signature gatherers prohibited.

- A person may not knowingly or purposefully physically prevent an individual from obtaining signatures or attempting to obtain signatures on a petition for a statewide ballot issue or physically intimidate another individual when that individual is obtaining or attempting to obtain signatures on a petition for a statewide ballot issue.
- A person who violates this section is guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$500, by imprisonment for not more than 90 days, or by both a fine and imprisonment.

Rights of Signature Gatherers (cont.)

- If an employer promises to pay you by the hour, the employer must pay you for the number of hours you worked regardless of how many signatures you collect on petitions.
- You must be paid at least the minimum wage and must be paid overtime for any hours over 40 hours worked in a work week.
- ☐ If you believe you have not been paid correctly, contact the Montana Department of Labor and Industry.
- Notify the Secretary of State or your county attorney if you are asked to accept payment based on the number of signatures you obtain.

Sponsor Responsibilities

It is the responsibility of the sponsor to ensure all applicable laws are followed, including those governing signature gathering activities and deadlines.

In addition, each ballot issue sponsor should review MCA Title 13, Chapter 27 and Article III, Article IV, and Article XIV of the Montana Constitution.

It is also recommended to review recent legislation passed in 2023 affecting the process (SB 93, SB 56).

The Constitution of Montana

ARTICLE III. GENERAL GOVERNMENT Part III. GENERAL GOVERNMENT

Initiative definition:

An initiative is when a citizen or group starts a petition for an idea they would like to change or become law or an amendment to the state constitution.



Initiative

Section 4. Initiative. (1) The people may enact laws by initiative on all matters except appropriations of money and local or special laws.

- (2) Initiative petitions must contain the full text of the proposed measure, shall be signed by at least five percent of the qualified electors in each of at least one-third of the legislative representative districts and the total number of signers must be at least five percent of the total qualified electors of the state. Petitions shall be filed with the secretary of state at least three months prior to the election at which the measure will be voted upon.
- (3) The sufficiency of the initiative petition shall not be questioned after the election is held.

Referendum definition:

A referendum is when a person or group seeks to overturn a law that has just been passed by the Montana Legislature.



Referendum

Section 5. Referendum. (1) The people may approve or reject by referendum any act of the legislature except an appropriation of money. A referendum shall be held either upon order by the legislature or upon petition signed by at least five percent of the qualified electors in each of at least one-third of the legislative representative districts. The total number of signers must be at least five percent of the qualified electors of the state. A referendum petition shall be filed with the secretary of state no later than six months after adjournment of the legislature which passed the act.

(2) An act referred to the people is in effect until suspended by petitions signed by at least 15 percent of the qualified electors in a majority of the legislative representative districts. If so suspended the act shall become operative only after it is approved at an election, the result of which has been determined and declared as provided by law.



How do initiatives and referendums end up on the ballot?

- ☐ To place an initiative or referendum on the ballot, petitioners must obtain a specified number of valid signatures of Montana registered voters.
- ☐ The total number of valid signatures required is determined by the state constitution.
- ☐ For a constitutional <u>initiative</u>, the statewide percentage is 5%, and 5% of the voters in each of at least 1/3 of the legislative representative districts.
- ☐ The percentage for a statutory initiative or <u>referendum</u> to qualify for the ballot is 5% statewide, and 5% of the qualified voters in each of at least 1/3 of the legislative representative districts.
- ☐ The percentage required for a referendum to suspend an act referred to the people is 15% of the voters in a majority of the legislative representative districts.

Required Reports and Signature Gatherers

Employers of paid signature gatherers must follow <u>13-27-112, MCA</u> .
The 2023 Legislature passed <u>SB 93</u> and <u>SB 56</u> which made changes to the way petitions are handled. One such change was <u>13-27-112(1)(a)</u> , <u>MCA</u> which requires employers of paid signature gatherers to register with the Secretary of State prior to gathering signatures.

Another change to the law made by SB 93 provided definitions for ballot issues and changed various ballot issue laws. This included establishing a non-refundable fee for filing ballot issues and providing a waiver, <u>13-27-215</u> , <u>MCA</u> . (Note: The fee for submitting a ballot issue is currently enjoined by a district court order.)
Another change was <u>13-27-103</u> , <u>MCA</u> which prohibits electronic signatures. A signature on a petition must be "the original signature of the elector in ink."



Responsibilities of Signature Gatherers

- □ While gathering signatures, ensure the full text of the ballot issue is attached to the petition if the full text is not already contained within each signature sheet.
 □ Allow anyone to read the full text of the ballot issue.
 □ Be in the presence of each signer when gathering signatures.
- ☐ Do **not** leave the petition unattended.
- ☐ Provide an affidavit of the signature gatherer with each petition sheet or section (up to 25 petition sheets may be fastened together per affidavit).
- ☐ There are 2 versions of the signature gatherer affidavit:
 - Affidavit of Petition Signature Gatherer which must be signed in front of a notary.
 - *Unsworn Declaration of Petition Gatherer* which does not require signature notarization.

Responsibilities of Signature Gatherers (cont.)

☐ Clearly print your name and address on the affidavit.

(Note: If the signer is not registered in the county, the signa	ture will be rejected.)

Responsibilities of signature gatherers (cont.)

Check to ensure signers provide the correct date; if they do not, have the signer change the date and place their initials next to the change.
After the last signature gathered is attached to the affidavit, write in the date on which you gathered the first signature attached to the affidavit.
Sign the affidavit <u>after</u> you gather the last signature on the petition sheet(s) you attach to it.
After you sign the affidavit, use a <u>new</u> affidavit for any additional signatures gathered.
Do not attach additional signatures after signing the affidavit.
Submit petition sheets to the sponsor and/or to the appropriate county election offices by applicable deadlines.

What should signature gatherers look for on the Petition Sheet?

WARNING - A person who purposefully signs a name other than the person's own to this petition, who signs more than one for the same issue at one election or who signs when not a legally registered Montana voter is subject to a \$500 fine, 6 m aths in jail, or both. Each person is required to sign the person's name and list the person's address or telephone number in dostantially the same manner as on the person's voter registration form or the agnature will not be counted. In place of a scidence address, the signer may provide the signer's post-office address or the signer's home telephone number.

Responsibilities of Signature Gatherers (cont.)

The most common mistake made on petitions is signing and dating the signature gatherer affidavit **before** gathering signatures. Your dated signature on the gatherer affidavit **must** be **AFTER** the dates of the signatures on the petition or those petition signatures **will be** rejected.

IMPORTANT NOTE

The laws are written to protect Montana's petition system from fraudulent signature gathering.

It is imperative you follow state law when you circulate a petition or the signatures you collect could be rejected!
